


In the 1940s it was owned by the Simpson Bros., who sold it to a Sydney solicitor, A.O. Ellison in 1948. Under his ownership the stud gained great recognition as the home of Star Kingdom. The current owner is Sir Tristian Antico who bought it in 1985. Workers say the main homestead burned down, but Oakleigh cottage is of interest. The stud was expanded over the years and its buildings clearly demonstrate differing periods of construction. Oakleigh cottage is the earliest building of the group. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Oakleigh cottage has significance as part of a substantially intact grouping on a regionally significant estate. The cottage and stud grouping are historically significant because of their association with the famous Widden Stud and with the rise of horse breeding in the Hunter Region. Aesthetically the group typefies studs in the area with the different buildings being representative of different stages of development. Oakleigh cottage and the group have social significance for continuously being used by prominent people as a horse and horse breeding property. Scientifically the group has the capacity to reveal information about lifestyles of the horse breeding fraternity over the past century and a half in the Upper Hunter. It therefore has regional scientific significance.
