His sons came to own Archerfield, Arrowfield, Strowan, Oaklands, Gyarran, Skellatar and Balmoral. The last of these was the property of William Bowman and it was still in the hands of his descendants in 1978. The Bowmans of Balmoral have been leading citizens of Muswellbrook since its foundation. William was the first mayor of Muswellbrook and a Member of Parliament. Balmoral homestead was commenced about 1857 and the family believe it was designed by Reuss and Brown and built by Bringeman and Dewar of local bricks with its original slate roof still in place. Historically this homestead is linked with one of the region's longest established families and one of the very first successful pastoralists in the region. Balmoral has regional historical significance for having been one of a number of surviving homesteads built by George Bowman for his many sons throughout the Upper Hunter Valley. Aesthetically the homestead is of significance to the region for its unusual features designed by regionally important Architects and built from bricks made on the property in the middle of the last century. Socially the building is of great significance to the current Bowman resident descendants and to other regional Bowman family descendants for whom the house provides tangible links with their ancestry. Scientifically the building is significant to the region for its potential to reveal a great deal which could contribute to an understanding of the lifestyle of the influential Bowmans of the mid-late 19th century and about the skills of local tradesmen and designers of the period. It is of a completeness rare in the region.
