The homestead was built for Malcolm's son, John M. Campbell in 1866, who ran 69 horses, 313 cattle on 700 acres and then lived in the home for 46 years. In 1932 the property was owned by F and L Watts. The house was built from stone quarried at Liddell. It was extended in 1900 when two sections were united and verandahs extended all round. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Historically the property has local significance for having been associated with an eminent Dartbrook pioneer and then having been built upon by one of the areas most successful later 19th century businessmen. Aesthetically the building is regionally significant for its rarity of type, quality and detail design. Socially it also has regional significance because of its almost half century association with the Campbell family. Scientifically the building is of local significance for its potential to reveal information which could contribute to an understanding of the lifestyle of a wealthy businessman of the late 19th century in Muswellbrook.
