

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<p>Built by solicitor Robert Fitzgerald in 1886 as his residence on a site bought from A. & E. Bowman, Hennor was originally surrounded by 5 acres of gardens. The front section of the house may be earlier than the rest: a detached office was used by Fitzgerald who was Mayor of Muswellbrook in the 1870s and an M.L.A. The cottage at No.10 Maitland Road was the house's coachman's cottage. The house was divided into flats during World War II but restored by John Jobling, Mayor, 1978. The interior features cedar joinery throughout, marble chimney pieces and plaster walls and ceilings. The house is in excellent condition and set on a corner site in a pleasant garden.</p>

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE																																	
<p>Historically this building and coachman's cottage is of considerable local significance having been built during the expansion of Muswellbrook in the late 19th century by an eminent local person on land originally owned by a prominent family and having survived ownership by a number of motel groups in the mid 20th century. Aesthetically the home is of local significance because of the apparent addition of the bullnosed verandah to an earlier, taller building. Socially the home has local significance for having begun life as the residence of the local mayor and then having also become the residential choice of the local mayor almost a century later. Scientifically the building and associated buildings and grounds are locally significant for their potential to reveal information which could contribute to an understanding of the various phases of development of the site, the location choices of the well to do in the latter 19th century and the scope of restoration completed in the latter 20th century. The home is of a composition and design unusual and therefore rare, at the local level.</p>
