

HISTORICAL NOTES

The building was constructed as a terrace-style or duplex residential building with only a small forecourt space between the building and street boundary. The building was auctioned by Mr. Mort under instructions from the executors of "the late Captain Wright" in March 1853, each building / part building, then sitting on 1/2 acre of land and each with "Out Offices" in the rear. Although the history is not clear, it is probable that the late Robert Luscombe purchased the property. After his death in 1890 the property was left to his family on trust providing they paid their debts. The property was later sold after the beneficiaries death in 1927, to Martin Joseph Curtin, for 1370 pounds. The house is now owned by the Thompson family with one section leased to a Chiropractor. Extensive extensions to the rear of the house occured in the 1970's. Interestingly, there still remain hand made spikes in the roof which were used instead of nails in the construction of buildings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building is one of the very earliest surviving stone houses in Muswellbrook and thus is of historical significance to the region for indicating the extent and form of the town in the first few decades of the 19th century. Aesthetically this "terrace" or duplex building is contained within a typical Georgian form. It thus has local aesthetic rarity and significance. It is also of local scientific significance for its potential to reveal information which could contribute to an understanding of the earliest forms of housing development in Muswellbrook.
