First cemetery there in 1828 (item KAYU/R001), school established 1867, second St Andrews Church (1882), one of the first creameries (1893), coal mine c.1905. Little remains of the village. The original homestead was replaced about 1932 with a new building designed by Edward Merewether and built by R.H. Smith, both of Newcastle. The McIntyres still live there: they have added only one room since 1932. The outbuildings are significant, including an 1840s shearing shed and a carriage shed. #### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Almost as significant as the cemetery, Kayuga Homestead is the second to have existed on the site, which is still occupied by the founding McIntyre family, one hundred and seventy years after original occupation. The homestead site is historically regionally significant for having provided a great many of the Kayuga community's social requirements throughout the 19th century: school, second St Andrews Church, creamery and coal mine. The current homestead is a fine example of the work of Newcastle Architect, Edward Merewether and is of local significance. Socially the site is of regional significance for its substantial contribution to the success of the Kayuga community throughout the 19th century. It is of regional scientific significance for its potential to reveal information which could contribute to an understanding of the working of this community throughout the twentieth century. For these reasons it is rare at the regional level.
