HISTORICAL NOTES The first church on this site was opened in 1862, a stone building described as both neat and substantial. The present church was constructed on the site of the original building in 1913 and it is likely that some of the materials were recycled. The Muswellbrook Historical Society refers to the church as "constructed in 1913 of red brick on a sandstone base, the neo-Gothic design with 'sub' Art Nouveau details creates a pleasing building". The handsome 20th century interior is intact and features diagonally boarded ceiling. Much of the stone work was carried out by a local stone mason (Armitage).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE Historically the building has local significance for its association with the growth of the Methodist Church in Muswellbrook in the early 20th century. Aesthetically the quirky use of stone in the porch is attributable to the availability of re-usable stone from the previous building. It is this feature which makes the design unusual and gives it local significance. Socially the building has local significance to generations of Methodist and Uniting Church worshippers in Muswellbrook. Scientifically, the building has local significance for its potential to reveal information which could contribute to an understanding of the expansion and style of worship of the Methodist Church in Muswellbrook.
