Overdene was originally the homestead of the Overton estate, which was a grant to the Newcastle Commandant Francis Allman in 1825 although it appears he did not reside there. In 1833 a major part of Overton was sold to John McDougall, although Allman retained a large acreage which led to two "Overtons" existing side by side. There is also evidence that Allman named his property "Kelso Place". The McDougall family later sold the property to Henry Nowland in 1858. George Blunt purchased the property in 1873. The house is significant with its association with George Blunt (1823-1905), railway contractor, draught horse breeder and pioneer irrigator. Overdene is thought to have been constructed in the 1830's as the homestead of Overton estate, although this evidence is not clear. The present Overton, a c.1910 house, stands further along the road and it is presumed that when the more recent house was built, the owners took up residence there and the names Overton and Overdene were exchanged.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although the property was founded and named Overton in 1825, the significance of the stone cottage now known as "Overdene" is not certain. The "Overton" property's historic significance is generally related to its ownership by George Blunt. The property has regional historic significance for its role in the development of irrigation in the Upper Hunter and for Blunt's significant contribution to the development of scientific farming methods in the region. It nevertheless is also significant for having been in continuous use for approximately a century and a half for pastoral purposes. Socially it is of regional significance to the descendants of the Nowland and Blunt families. Scientifically it ranks with the most significant properties in the region for its potential to reveal information which could contribute to an understanding of the more sophisticated farming techniques, especially in relation to the growing of lucerne developed and used in the Upper Hunter in the latter part of the 19th century. For this reason it is rare both locally and regionally.
