Church in the establishment phase of Muswellbrook in the later 19th century. Aesthetically the fine detail and dramatic significance create its				
unique local aesthetics. Socially it	is of local significance because o	of its century of association with	h the housing of the Presbyterian ministers in	
Muswellbrook. Scientifically the building has local significance for its potential to reveal information which would contribute to an understanding				
of the conduct of the Presbyterian Church activity in the Upper Hunter during the latter 19th and the 20th century.
